The programme first commenced at the Annual Black MBA (Masters in Business Administration) Conference.

Southwark Council decided that there was a need in the British community for this and they started the Southwark Black Mentor Leaders Programme, founded in 2000 and still going strong till date.

The programme is geared at helping, improving and guiding children between the ages of 13 to 16 and we have post 16 support till their 19th birthday within Southwark Borough.

The LOT programme has made a lot of impact in the lives of the children on the programme. It has brought a lot of exposure, travelling, networking, confidence, and much better performance and achievements, gearing them individually to aim higher to become Leaders of Tomorrow creating change in their society.

Over the last 10 years the success rates has been very innovative as we have children making fantastic grades in A' levels, going off to universities, some have done internship programmes with global co-operations like Bentley, some winning scholarships for programmes in Brazil etc.

As we go into the next phase of this programme, we expect more achievements to come from our aspiring leaders of tomorrow.

We decided to go around and tell our teachers all about L.O.T and the trip we had to raise money for, there were results but they were not effective considering the time we had on our hands, and our mistake was being sponsored as a pair as many teachers sponsored us little amounts and expected us to then split it between us. We then went off and tried on our own, having already asked most of the teachers and in the process came up with many ideas to raise money individually. However Renee and I still wanted to maintain the joint effort, so we baked many fairy cakes and cookies to sell to our friends at school, staff and neighbors. I also got money from my family, church and primary school. The remaining money was raised through art by drawing portraits and oil painting on canvas for £25 each with full profit since my kind art teacher provided me with the resources.

With economical downfalls in the "credit crunch", especially in America, the numbers of young people who participated had shrunk in comparison to last year, however this did not affect the amount of knowledge and words of wisdom we were being fed.
