Vallin's background is in education, youth and equalities. He has taught in Montego Bay, Jamaica (1974-1979) and in London on teacher exchange programme (1979-1981)

Vallin developed student leadership programmes, provided mentoring and inclusion support for vulnerable children and young people and encouraged BME parents to be more active in their children's education. He also advised Southwark Children's Services on equalities issues to ensure a more inclusive curriculum.

Vallin has considerable skills and experience in organising and leading groups on international education visits and youth exchange programmes.
